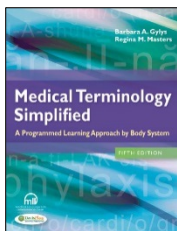
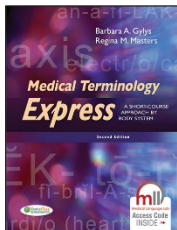


# Which Medical Terminology text is right for my course?

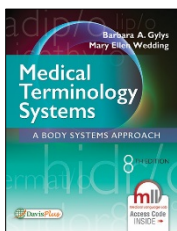
Check the following statements in guiding your selection of a Medical Terminology text.



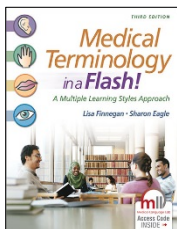
- I like having fewer chapters than the larger Medical Terminology books.
